Fire Department Launches Program For Special Needs Students

The Hoffman Estates Fire Department, in partnership with the Northwest Special Recreation Association (NWSRA), launched a groundbreaking program this fall designed to bring the experience and education of firefighting to people with special needs.

The Fully Involved Fire Academy ran for six weeks this September and October and is the first of its kind in the region. Participants were given a unique opportunity to experience what it is like to be a firefighter while building confidence, teamwork skills and community connections.

Throughout the academy, participants learned about various aspects of the fire service, including how firefighters use different types of apparatus and tools during emergencies. Hands-on sessions allowed them to practice extrication techniques, handle fire hoses to spray water at targets, and explore search and rescue techniques. They also gained practical first aid knowledge and developed a deeper understanding of how firefighters respond to emergencies.

Hoffman Estates Fire Chief Alan Wax said that the program demonstrates the department's commitment to inclusion and community engagement. "The Fully Involved Fire Academy shows that everyone can be part of the fire service in their own way," he said. "It's about giving participants the chance to learn, to achieve, and to feel connected."

The Academy has been met with enthusiasm from both participants and families, who expressed gratitude for the chance to see loved ones thrive in a supportive and handson learning environment. Organizers hope the program will serve as a model for other communities to follow.

Historian's notebook

t was a cold December day in 1958 – not the kind of weather that anyone would want to be out in. The temperature was in the low 30's and most of Hoffman Estates residents were getting ready to sit down to a nice hot meal. The quiet of the evening was suddenly filled with sirens.

The date was December 3, 1958, the anniversary of one of the most ferocious fires in Hoffman Estates' history at the Community Center, which was part of the Hammerstein Farm located at Evanston and Flagstaff Lanes. Only us old timers remember this terrible fire.

This wasn't the first time that the Community Center had been on fire that year. It had only been a few weeks earlier that one of the smaller barns on the property had burned. This time, however, it was the huge barn that not only housed the community center, but also the boy scout troops and their equipment. On the east of the barn was the newly

organized volunteer Hoffman Estates Fire Department Barn and their \$20,000 La France fire engine.

As the calls went out, local fire departments from five neighboring communities began to arrive. The closest fire hydrant was 500 feet away, so extra hoses had to be strung. The icy conditions created more problems due to a shortage of slickers and boots. A fog began to settle in, wrapping the neighborhood in an eerie glow from the flames of the growing fire. Hindered by the mounting problems, the more than 70 firemen and volunteer firemen battled the blaze for more than 2 ½ hours.

Neighbors began to crowd the local streets to watch the brave and dedicated firemen fight to save the Community Center.

Soon, the nearby neighbors began arriving with pots of very welcomed hot coffee for the firefighters. The fight continued into the night. By the next day the firefighters

still found pockets of flames that needed to be struck out. The smell of smoke hung over the entire village.

Our firefighters were able to save their newly developed fire barn and equipment. Sadly, the remainder of the huge barn was completely destroyed. Since it was insured, some help was given to the scouts but not enough to cover their losses.

After an investigation, the fire was determined to not be from arson. No exact cause was never reported.

One of the neighbors, Mr. Art Hagstrom, lived on Grand Canyon St. and had a direct view of the buildings as they burned. His awesome pictures showed the true story of that tragic night. I've included one above along with the recollections of that December night 67 years ago.

New E-Bike, E-Scooter, E-Moto Regulations in Place

With a rapid increase in the use of E-bikes and E-scooters in Hoffman Estates, particularly among young people, local ordinances have been updated to help maintain a safe and reliable transportation system for all residents.

The updated traffic regulations clarify where electric bicycles, scooters, motorcycles and other electronic transportation devices can and cannot be used throughout the community. The regulations vary depending on the class and speed of these electronic devices.

Emergency vehicles and motorized wheelchairs are exempt from these restrictions.

Class 1: motor that provides assistance only when pedaling; up to 20 mph.

Low-Speed E-Scooter: device less than 100 pounds, with 2 or 3 wheels, handlebars, and a floorboard that can be stood upon while riding; powered by an electric motor with maximum speed up to 10 miles per hour.

E-Scooter: device, with 2 or 3 wheels, handlebars, and a floorboard that can be stood upon while riding; powered by an electric motor with maximum speed in excess of 10 miles per hour.



Motor Driven Devices

Regulation

Operation of Motor Driven Devices Prohibited

No person shall operate Motor Driven Devices upon any public or private street,
public sidewalk, parking lot, bike path or public park.

Motor Driven Devices: motorcycle, motor scooter, moped, or motor driven skateboard with less than 150 cubic centimeter displacement, excluding E-Bikes and E-Scooters.

Where does it go?

The sanitary sewer is a system of underground pipes that carry wastewater from bathrooms, sinks, kitchens, and other plumbing components to a wastewater treatment plant where it is filtered and treated before being discharged into a waterway.

The storm sewer is a system designed to carry rainfall runoff and other clean water sources only. Runoff is carried in underground pipes or open ditches, and then discharged - untreated - into local streams, rivers and other surface water bodies. Storm sewer inlets are typically found along curbs and other low-lying outdoor areas.

Disposal of chemicals or hazardous substances to the storm sewer system damages the environment. Motor oil, cleaners, paints and other common household items that get into storm drains pollute groundwater sources and can poison fish, birds, and other wildlife. In addition, grass clippings, leaves, litter and organic matter can clog storm drains and contribute to flooding.

- Do not pour ANYTHING into storm sewer drains.
- Keep storm sewer drains clear of leaves, grass clippings, sticks and litter.
- Clean up after pet waste and throw it away.
- · Repair leaks from your vehicle and recycle motor oil.
- Clean up spills DO NOT wash them into storm drains.
- Minimize the use of fertilizers, pesticides and herbicides.

We all benefit from clean water, and each of us has a role in keeping our lakes, rivers, wetlands and groundwater clean. Report illegal dumping or spills by calling the Public Works Department at 847-490-6800 or emailing publicworks@vohe.org.

Natural Christmas trees (including flocked trees) may be dropped off for disposal at no charge between Friday, Dec. 26 and Sunday, Jan. 11 at the following locations:

Code Enforcement Division:

Don't Let Trees, Foliage

OBSTRUCT THE SIDEWALK

Bushes, shrubs, and trees that block the sidewalk can cause unsafe conditions for pedestrians who may be forced to walk on the parkway or in the street. The Code Enforcement Division requests that homeowners properly trim back any excessive landscape growth on their private properties abutting public sidewalks.

After trimming, branches can be prepared for collection by Groot on regular garbage days. Yard waste stickers are not required for disposal through Groot.

Acceptable yard waste can be prepared as follows:

- Paper landscape bags (not to exceed 50 lbs)
- Brush bundles (not to exceed 50lbs, 5' in length, 24" in diameter and no limbs greater than 5" in diameter)
- Resident-supplied rigid plastic containers (not to exceed 50 lbs or 32 gallons)
- Yard waste specific Groot toter cart (rental fee \$30/yr, billed \$2.50/month)

In addition to yard waste, residents using their own rigid plastic container or a Groot yard waste cart may include organic food scraps along with yard waste for composting. Organic compost waste will not be accepted in paper landscape bags.

If publicly owned parkway tree branches are hanging over the sidewalk and interfering with pedestrians, please call the Public Works Department at 847-490-6800 to report the location for remediation.

Specialty Team Spotlight: Hoffman Estates Fire Department

DIVE/WATER RESCUE TEAM

The Hoffman Estates Fire Department has several specialty teams. No emergency is ever the same, so different situations require different expertise, equipment, and approaches.

HEFD's Dive Team consists of nine specialty-trained rescue divers, with three divers on each of the Department's three shifts. The Dive Team receives specialty training for rescuing both submerged victims and those on the water's surface, as well as training in search and recovery of underwater evidence. The Dive Team operates utilizing a Surface Supplied Air (SSA) system that uses equipment to supply breathing air to divers underwater through umbilical cables from the surface.

In addition to answering calls to help in local and regional water emergencies, the Dive Team members can also be deployed throughout the nation for water-based emergencies.

HEFD Lt. Nick Forsythe was deployed to North Carolina during Hurricane Helene in 2024. His deployment lasted 14 days and included several swiftwater-based rescues, primary searches for missing victims, and the clearing of structures, vehicles, and debris.

The HEFD's Dive Team would also like to remind residents to practice water safety:

- Always wear a personal flotation device in open
 "Turn around, Don't drown" water and around pools if you cannot swim
- Dive in designated areas only
- Never swim alone
- Avoid drugs and alcohol near water
- - It only takes 6 inches of moving water to knock over
 - It only takes 12 inches of moving water to carry away most cars.
- There is NO safe ice!

Fire Station 21 & 22

Jonstruction [[] Applates

Later this fall, crews at Fire Station 21 are expected to move into the newly-constructed building, which was built next door to the existing Fire Station 21 at 225 Flagstaff Ln. Once construction is complete, demolition of the old station will take place, with landscaping, groundwork, and parking lot work to follow.

Plans also call for a new sled hill to be added to Chino Park using dirt moved on the site during the construction process. With demolition activities pending and more groundwork to be done, the new sled hill is scheduled to open for the 2026-2027 winter season.

With an estimated construction cost of \$9 million, the new Station 21 features expanded apparatus bays, upgraded living quarters for firefighters, and improved operational areas to better accommodate firefighting and emergency medical equipment.

Fencing is in place in anticipation of demolition work at the new site for Fire Station 22 at the northeast corner of Governors Lane and Higgins Road. Demolition activities are scheduled to start this November, with construction anticipated to begin June 2026.

Holiday observances

Village Hall will be closed
Thursday, Nov. 27, and Friday,
Nov. 28, in observance of the
Thanksgiving holiday. There will
be no change in the garbage and
recycling pickup schedule the week
of Thanksgiving.

Village Hall will also be closed on Christmas Eve, Wednesday, Dec. 24, on Christmas, Thursday, Dec. 25, and for New Year's Day on Thursday, Jan. 1. Garbage and recycling pickup will be delayed by one day during these holiday weeks.

Daylight saving time ends

Daylight saving time ends at 2 a.m. on Sunday, Nov. 2. In addition to rolling clocks back one hour, the Fire Department reminds residents to also replace the batteries in smoke and carbon monoxide (CO) alarms. The National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) recommends placement of at least one smoke alarm on every level of the home (including basements), and within 15 feet of all sleeping areas. CO alarms are required on each level of the home and are recommended near sleeping areas.

Keep leaves off the street

Raking or blowing yard waste into the street is a violation of the Village's Municipal Code. When yard waste is pushed into the street, it can wash away to cover storm water grates, which can contribute to flooding. Be sure that grass clippings, garden debris and raked leaves end up in brown paper yard waste bags, in a resident-supplied rigid plastic container (not to exceed 50 lbs or 32 gallons, or in a yard waste specific Groot toter cart for disposal on regular garbage days through the end of November. Yard waste stickers are not required for collection.

The yard waste collection program through Groot will end Monday, Nov. 24 for residents north of I-90, and Wednesday, Nov. 26, for those south of I-90 (including households west of Bartlett Road). Public Works prepares for winter

As cooler weather approaches, our Public Works team is already preparing for the upcoming winter season. They have been busy stocking up on salt and de-icing liquids, thoroughly checking and maintaining equipment, and training staff on new machinery and updated procedures to improve our response capabilities.

Snow removal procedures call for major streets to be plowed first, followed by side streets and cul-de-sacs. To ensure efficient snow removal, avoid shoveling or blowing snow into the streets or onto fire hydrants. Parking on Village streets is prohibited for eight hours after a snowfall or two inches or more, or until the street has been cleared. For safety, remind children to stay away from streets while playing in the snow. Thank you for your cooperation and understanding as we work to keep our Village safe and accessible all winter long.
