Construction on the New

Fire Station 22 Starting in September

Construction is slated to begin this September on the new Fire Station 22. The community is invited to join local officials and first responders for the groundbreaking ceremony for the new station on Saturday, Sept. 12, at 11 a.m., at the construction site at 1801 Governors Ln., near the northeast corner of Higgins Road and Governors Lane.

A Fire Station Feasibility and Space Needs Study was conducted for the Village in 2022. The study found that Station 22, originally built in the 1970s, requires significant investments to meet the demands for modern fire protection and emergency medical services. As a result, the Village elected to replace Station 22 with a newly constructed facility in a new location.

The estimated cost for construction of the new Station 22 is approximately \$16 million, excluding land acquisition costs. Based on recommendations in the study, the new station is being built in an ideal location for service delivery, less than a fifth of a mile north of the current station.

The same study also recommended the replacement of Fire Station 21, located at 225 Flagstaff Ln. Construction on that new station was completed in February 2026.

During the construction period, the current Fire Station 22 will remain operational to ensure that public safety services continue without interruption. Learn more about this project on our website at hoffmanestates.org.

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Historian's notebook

It was about this time of year, maybe with a little nip in the air, that got the Sunderlage Farm family working on what needed to be done before the animals would be chosen for the smoking process. The smokehouse had to be cleared of all of Mother's cook pots, spoons, and grinders from a hot summer of cooking. Her wash board and scrubbing tub also had to be pulled out; they would be put on the back porch for the season.

The small brick building at Sunderlage Farm is large for a smokehouse. It is 12 by 16 feet with two windows; one on the east wall and one on west wall. Windows are very rare in a smokehouse, as it needs to be an airtight building. The windows helped bring in light for the cooking and washing duties that mother had to do during the summertime. She liked to keep the house as cool as possible on those very hot days in July and August.

Each year, she hoped there would be fewer tears from the children. They had been taught that this was why they raised the animals, to give their life so the family would have food for the year ahead. Everyone would have a job to help prepare the meat for the smokehouse.

It was an exhausting job to get the meat ready for smoking. It would be cut into sizes that could be managed in the smokehouse and much was made into sausages, a favorite of the entire family. It was known that some sausages disappeared from the hanging racks, but no one had any idea as to who had taken them. Much of the other meat was either brined or salted before it went into the smokehouse.

Based on the early family history, we believe the smokehouse was built shortly after they all arrived from Badbergen, Germany in 1834. Food was needed and the smokehouse

went up. It helped feed other early settlers, the Mayers, Oatmans and Greve families.

This small building is very special – so special that it is on the National Register of Historic Places. It is unique in its Greek Revival style with thick brick walls and windows that are rare in smokehouses. There are no others like it in Northern Illinois.

The Sunderlage Farmhouse is celebrating its 170th anniversary this year. 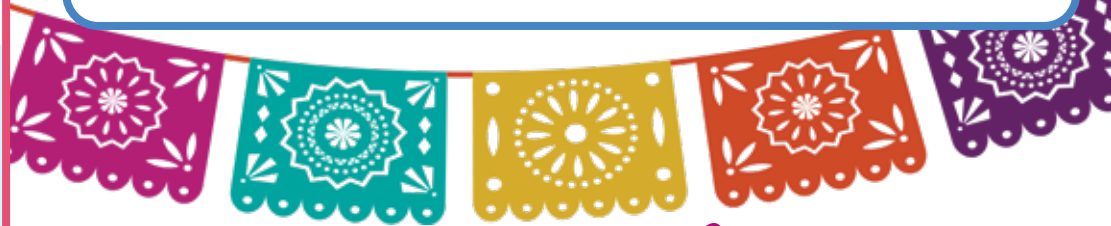

10 Facts about Storm Water

1. Storm sewers are designed to collect rainwater runoff only.
2. Water entering the storm sewer system is not treated before moving into downstream waterways (ponds, creeks, wetlands, etc.).
3. All open grated drains that can collect surface water are part of the storm sewer system.
4. Sump pumps that collect surface water or ground water from the house perimeter discharge into the storm sewer through surface runoff or direct pipe connection.
5. All interior house drains, including floor drains and ejector pump discharges, do not enter the storm sewer system. These sources enter a separate sanitary sewer system that flows to a water treatment plant before being released into downstream waterways.
6. Dumping of any pollutants or waste into a storm sewer is never permitted and can pollute downstream waterways.
7. Runoff may become polluted as it runs along roads, parking lots, roofs, lawns and construction sites.
8. Runoff may contain pollutants, such as automotive fluids, fertilizers and pesticides, leaves, sediment, litter, and pet waste.
9. Please do your part to keep storm water clean! Everyone can help reduce the amount of pollution carried in storm water.
10. Report illegal dumping or spills by calling the Public Works Department at 847-490-6800 or emailing publicworks@vohe.org. Use the Police non-emergency number, 847-882-1818 after 4 pm on weekdays or on weekends.

The Village encourages all residents and businesses to take pride in their storm water quality. Visit the storm water management web page for tips and more information at hoffmanestates.org/stormwater.

Residents can help reduce the risk of local flooding by keeping storm sewer inlets free of obstructions. Please help by removing leaves, paper, branches or ice obstructing an inlet. Respiratory Syncytial Virus (RSV)

Respiratory Syncytial Virus (RSV) is a highly contagious virus and a leading cause of hospitalization in infants under 1-year-old. Symptoms can start like a common cold—sneezing, runny nose, cough, and fever—but may quickly

become serious, causing wheezing, difficulty breathing, and trouble eating or drinking. In severe cases, RSV can lead to bronchiolitis or pneumonia.

Protect your baby this RSV season with a preventative antibody that helps reduce the risk of severe illness. Request an appointment online at portal.hoffmanestates.org.

Get Ready for Flu Season

Flu Season usually begins in October and can last through May. To reduce the risk of flu, CDC recommends vaccine for everyone aged 6 months and older.

Branch pickup begins by zone on Sept. 21

The Public Works Department will conduct a free curbside tree branch pickup service beginning Monday, Sept. 21, starting with Zone A. This program is for residents covered by the Village refuse collection contract.

Public Works crews WILL accept:

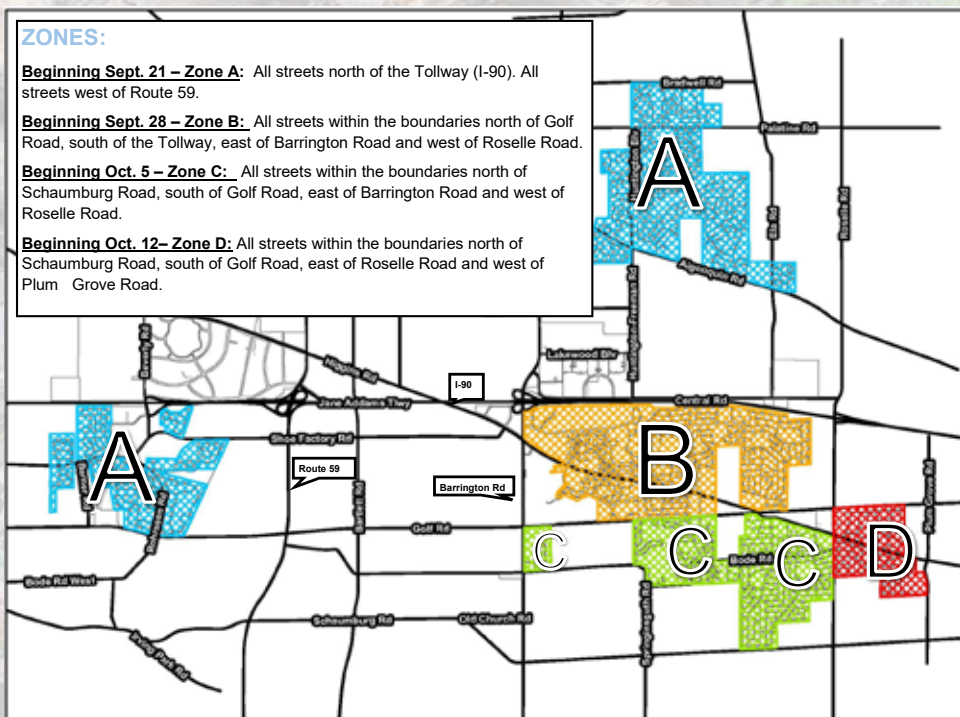
- Branches no larger than 8 inches in diameter or 10 feet in length
- Shrub trimmings and similar brush
- Willow tree branches if separated from other materials

Public Works crews will NOT accept:

- Tree trunks, stumps or root balls
- Firewood
- Railroad ties or landscape timbers
- Grass clippings, leaves, sod, plants or yard waste

Only one collection pass will be made for each street (no exceptions). If branches are too large, mixed with unacceptable materials or are not properly prepared, they will not be picked up.

Stack branches neatly at curbside by 7 a.m. on the first date of pickup listed for your zone, facing the cut ends toward the street. Please do not tie branches in bundles or place them in any container. Branches should not block sidewalks, mailboxes, fire hydrants, or protrude into the street.



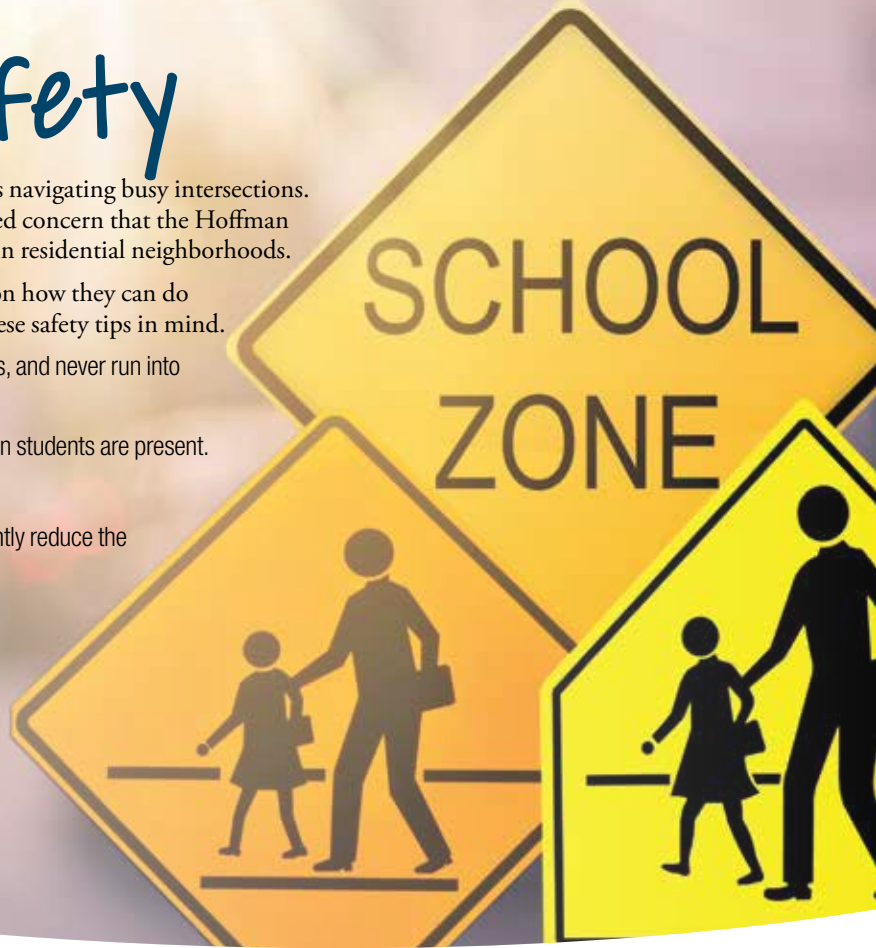
School Zone Safety

The journey for students to travel to and from school often involves navigating busy intersections. Ensuring these pathways are secure is important. The most expressed concern that the Hoffman Estates Police Department receives from residents is driving safety in residential neighborhoods.

With school back in session, this a great time to educate everyone on how they can do their part to promote pedestrian safety near schools. Please keep these safety tips in mind.

- Pedestrians should always look both ways, make eye contact with drivers, and never run into traffic.
- Speed limits are reduced to 20 MPH in school zones on school days when students are present.
- Motorists are required to stop for pedestrians in crosswalks.
- Attentive driving, free from distractions like mobile phones, can significantly reduce the risk of accidents.

The Hoffman Estates Police Department makes school safety a priority and residents will see an increased presence at the schools for drop off and pick up. Motorists who speed, disobey stop signs, and illegally pass school buses with their stop signs activated will be ticketed. Our schools also have school resource officers on site that help facilitate safe practices for drop off and pick up.

Why Close Your Bedroom Door?

A closed bedroom door can help protect you during a home fire. It can slow the spread of heat, smoke, and toxic gases, giving you more time to escape or wait for help.

Closed Door vs. Open Door

With an Open Door:

- Heat can become extremely dangerous.
- Smoke and carbon monoxide can quickly fill the room.
- You may have only seconds to react.

With a Closed Door:

- Temperatures stay much lower.
- Air remains safer to breathe.
- You have more time to escape or be rescued.

Fire Safety Tips

- Close all bedroom and living area doors before going to sleep.
- Install smoke alarms inside and outside sleeping areas and on every level of your home.
- Test smoke alarms every month.
- Practice a home fire escape plan with your family.
- Before opening a door during a fire, feel it with the back of your hand. If it is hot, do not open it. Use another exit if possible.

Remember

A closed door can slow the spread of fire, reduce smoke damage, and provide valuable time during an emergency. Shut your door tonight and sleep safer.

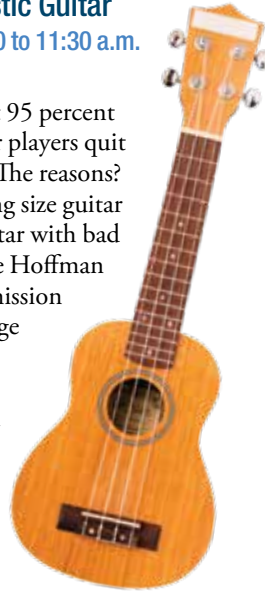
