Public Works wins national snowfighting award

The Village's Public Works Department won a Safe and Sustainable Snowfighting award from the Salt Institute for excellence in environmental consciousness and effective management in the storage and application of winter road salt.

Cleared winter roads save lives. Every winter, more than 116,000 Americans are injured and over 1,300 are killed as a result of pavement that is covered in snow, slush or ice. But a study of highways in Snow Belt states showed that road salt reduces crashes by up to 88 percent.

When the economic impact of shutting down roads is factored in, road salt becomes even more valuable. A major one-day snowstorm can cost a state \$300 to \$700 million in direct and indirect costs, including lost revenue and productivity. Deicing roads pays for itself within the first 25 minutes

after the salt is spread – making proper salt storage and timely application a smart investment.

The Public Works Department provides snow removal and ice control for 158 miles of roads and 367 culs-de-sac. All roads are cleared within 14 hours after snow has stopped for any given snowfall amount. Sixteen large salting/plowing trucks, 20 smaller plowing trucks and other smaller vehicles, and the entire Public Works team support this program.

Historian's notebook

What plastics are accepted in my curbside recycling program?

Plastic bottles and containers numbered 1 through 5 and 7 (NOT number 6*) are accepted in your curbside recycling bin or toter. Examples include:

- Plastic beverage and food containers
- Milk, water and juice bottles
- Liquid detergent, fabric softener, bleach and shampoo bottles
- Yogurt cups
- Vegetable oil bottles

Containers should be empty and free of excess liquids and food residue. Caps and labels can be left on empty bottles. Do NOT include utensils, plates, toys, plant pots, garden hoses, pools or plastic bags. Plastic bags can blow away as well as clog sorting machinery; however, they are collected at most major grocery stores for recycling.



**What about number 6, polystyrene plastics?*

At this time, Groot does not accept number 6 polystyrene (PS) plastics. Polystyrene comes in two forms: expanded (fluffy and white) and rigid (usually clear). This plastic is mostly air, often coated with food contaminants and can cost up to 300 percent more than other commodities to recycle due to its lightweight nature, lack of market competition and high transportation costs. Do not add number 6 polystyrene plastics to your curbside recycling bin or toter!

Fifty-eight years ago, on March 17, 1960, Hoffman Estates installed its first police chief – Mark Orlick, a 24-year-veteran of the Highland Park, Michigan, Police Department.

His first order of business would be to hire new police officers. The starting salary was \$4,800 for the first six months. It wasn't certain if more than one officer could be hired, however, due to budget constraints. New officers had to reside in Hoffman Estates for one year, pass all physical examinations, be between 5 foot 9 inches and 6 foot 2 inches tall, and not be underweight.

Chief Orlick got right to the business of serving the residents of Hoffman Estates. He brought police forms and a month's supply of traffic tickets from Highland Park to see

him through until he'd be able to print his own. He needed to purchase a Ford heavy-duty police cruiser with a special V-8 engine. He had a Detroit dealer in mind, but would also ask for a competitive price from a local dealer. Until the new squad car arrived, officers would drive their own vehicles or a rental car.

Chief Orlick came to Hoffman Estates with an excellent background. He had organized the Hazel Park, Michigan, Police Department, taught classes for the FBI, received two citations for bravery, and completed a course in police study at the Northwestern Traffic Institute. He also held the rank of lieutenant colonel in the Michigan Army National Guard.

One of the requirements for his position as police chief was to reside in Hoffman Estates.

Until he sold his home in Michigan, he decided to live at the Village Hall. At that time, it was the old Hammerstein farmhouse. It's not known how long he lived there, but he was certainly always available for any emergency situation. Chief Orlick worked around the clock to get the new Police Department up and running.

Chief Orlick was Hoffman Estates' police chief until June 1963. He could have never foreseen the tremendous growth of our Village. He would be so impressed with the beautiful police station located on Higgins Road and Spring Mill Drive. His early work was essential to establishing a reliable police force for the young Hoffman Estates, a Village that continues "Growing to Greatness."


Safe and Sustainable Snowfighting award

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About 26 million tons of deicing salt are applied to roads in the United States each year. Public Works uses anywhere from 2,300 tons to 7,200 tons annually depending on how much snow falls. The Village's salt dome, built in 2008, holds a maximum of 5,500 tons and has four liquid deicer storage tanks on site with a total combined capacity of 20,000 gallons.

Hoffman Estates is one of only 85 agencies in the United States and Canada to receive this award. Additionally, it was one of only nine new recipients this year. This recognition is a testament to Public Works' good snow removal and ice control practices.




History of trolleys


Month-long food drive

March is National Nutrition Month. Proper nutrition is especially important for young people whose bodies and minds depend on food-based nutrients for development. In 2017, the Illinois Commission to End Hunger determined that more than half a million Illinois households have inconsistent access to food. Additionally, the commission found that 17 percent of Illinois youth age 0 to 17 live in poverty, which impacts their ability to perform well in school, build strong bodies and strengthen minds. Health and Human Services will be hosting a month-long food drive to support individuals and families in our community who have insecure food access. Save our sewers: flushing “flushables”

What Hoffman Estates residents put down drains and toilets can negatively impact the environment, and put everyone’s health at risk. Even items labeled “flushable” can clog pipes, tangle pumps, and result in messy and costly sewer backups.



Here is a list of items that should never be flushed down the toilet, regardless of whether the label states the item is flushable:

- Baby, disinfectant and moist wipes
- Vitamins, medicines and other pharmaceuticals
- Toilet bowl scrub pads
- Swiffer™ or similar cleaning products
- Napkins and paper towels
- Dental floss
- Fats, oils and greases
- Sanitary napkins, tampons, condoms and other nonorganic materials
- Wash cloths, rags and other cloth items
- Band-Aids™ or dressings
- Plastic bags and wrappers
- Cat litter, animal feces, fish gravel and other animal products

There are only two items that we should ever flush: human waste and toilet paper. Items that are labeled flushable should be thrown into the garbage rather than into the sewer system. In a sewer system, the actions of one resident may cause a sewer backup for others.

Citizen Lifesaving Award for a near-drowning incident at Hoffman Estates High School on Nov. 30, 2017

Christopher Fetterman is a teacher at Hoffman Estates High School. While instructing a class in the pool on Nov. 30, 2017, he was notified that a student was struggling to stay afloat in the pool by another student, Kira Nicole Weiland. Mr. Fetterman entered the pool and, with the assistance of Kira, brought the student to the pool deck. First aid care was administered until the Hoffman Estates Fire Department arrived.

Citizen Lifesaving Award for successfully providing CPR to a neighbor who had collapsed on Nov. 12, 2017

Tyler Matuszczak was leaving his house at approximately 8:30 p.m. on Nov. 12, 2017, when he observed his elderly neighbor collapse in the driveway next door. Tyler immediately took action. He notified the victim’s wife, contacted 911 and began CPR. Tyler continued to provide CPR until the Hoffman Estates Fire Department arrived.
